LEARNING LESSONS IN GERMANY

The first time I went on a Friendship Force trip was to Germany in 1982. There were 240 people on board a plane from Des Moines to Berlin. A newly-formed club of 77 participants deplaned in Berlin and 77 Germans boarded our plan for the return to Des Moines where they met the FFGDM club members who home hosted them.

We were to spend two weeks with our German hosts, most of whom we had corresponded with prior to our departure. My American friend was worried for me that I would not have suitable accommodations as I had acknowledged on my application that I was a farmer. She assumed that all farms had outhouses in other countries. I was assigned to a German farm family.

I assured my friend that I would be fine. I was not opposed to using an outhouse; I had used one before. However, she insisted on arranging a plan by phone that would bring her immediately to me if I found my conditions not acceptable as she assumed her accommodations would be.

We arrived in Berlin. The German man who was pairing ambassadors and home hosts, pointed at my name badge, "Robel", and then pointed to his own, they were the same. Wow! How about that – all the way to Germany to find someone with my husband's family name. He called out my name and Gertrude stepped forward to claim me. Another WOW! Because it was a great pairing. She was smiling pleasantly, I knew I would like her. We soon left for her home.

Getting out of her car, I saw an immense two-story home and beautiful grounds. She <u>had</u> told me she lived on a farm – a farm of two acres! Her father was a steel manufacturer in Berlin during WWII and had sent Gertrude, her mother and sister to the farm for safety. The farm was on the 'outskirts of Berlin" and within a block of the Berlin Wall.

After leaving my suitcase in a very large bedroom, she showed me the bathroom. In contained a modern stool with a water closet above, a sink and a four-footed tub. There were luxurious towels and carpet.

Gertrude was a gardener like me. The next morning, we walked in the garden on 'the farm'; it was all flowers, no tomatoes, or other vegetables. The house had been used by the Soviets and the Germans as housing because it was so large. She, as a sixteen-year-old, had escaped the amorous attention of the Soviet soldiers by hiding in the garden. Later, when the Germans occupied the house, she was again forced to hide in the garden.

She survived the occupation of Berlin by serving as a housemaid for American officers. She was well educated and spoke English.

We talked constantly. I am from a German family and we discovered we shared a lot of traditions and ideas of farm life. One day I was showing her pictures of my family – a son, a daughter, and my husband. She said, "Your daughter looks just like your husband, but your son doesn't look like either one of you. Doesn't that bother your husband?" At first, I didn't comprehend what she meant and I must have looked bewildered. Finally, I said, "I don't know, I'll have to ask him when I get home." I smiled. I got it. "That would bother a German man" she replied. That was how I learned to laugh and accept the differences in cultures.

Another lesson came when my friend, who had proudly announced upon our arrival that she was going to stay with "a doctor's family in the city", called daily to see if you could stay at Gertrude's. She had only a sofa to sleep on within the doctor's apartment. It was a small room with a Great Dane as a companion who often welcomed her with liquid kisses, a lot.

I have learned so much – so many things from others I have met. Gertrude and I have gone to many places together since 1982 but the most important thing I know is that everyone everywhere is the same. We all want peace and happiness for ourselves and our children.

We visited three areas of Thailand: Bangkok, Chiang Mai, and Railey Beach.

The first thing we learned in Bangkok was that the beloved King Bhumibol Adulyadej had passed away in October at the age of 88. There were shrines in his memory everywhere. We visited the Buddhist temple of Wat Pho where we viewed the Reclining Budda, the largest in Thailand at 151 feet long and 49 feet tall.

In Chiang Mai we visited Wat Chedi Luang temple ruin, from the 14th and 15th century, and attended Zabb E Lee, a Thai cooking school. The director was a marvelous teacher and we each made our own meal that was delicious. I hope to be able to replicate now that I am home. We also visited Patara Elephant Rescue farm where we fed, rode, and washed the elephants. An amazing day and the handlers and elephants were very patient with us.

Our last stop was Railey Beach, we took a plane, bus, golf cart, and long-tail boat to arrive at our destination. The weather was beautiful - wonderful temperatures and no humidity – a great way to end a wonderful trip.

ADDITIONS TO THE FRIENDSHIP FORCE DICTIONARY

We want to share with you some minor changes made in the terms used to describe some Friendship Force program experiences.

With the goal of opening our mission to more potential members around the world, we want to use terms that more accurately describe and reflect the FFI experience. Don't worry - it's still the same FFI you know and love, but now you'll be able to explain it better!

Journey

We often hear that calling our travel and hosting programs "exchanges" is confusing, since the word no longer directly explains the programs we offer. While they are cultural exchanges, our programs are rarely reciprocal trips as originally developed, where one group directly "exchanges" with another. At FFI headquarters, we strongly feel that a more transformational term - "journey" - is better suited to the amazing programs our members plan and experience. Additionally, market research conducted on FFI's behalf in eight countries revealed that the phrase "journey" best described Friendship Force programs and activities. You will see this new term (planning a "Journey" instead of an "Exchange") used throughout our new website and in FFI communications and materials from here on out!

Ambassador Coordinator and Host Coordinator

In line with our incorporation of the word "journey," we also have altered the term Exchange Director to now be called "Ambassador Coordinator" and "Host Coordinator." Not only does the term "coordinator" translate well into the many languages spoken by our members worldwide, but we also believe it reflects the variety of work that our dedicated ambassador and host leaders undertake in planning a Friendship Force Journey.

Mission - Focused Itineraries

For each Journey listed on the catalog, there will be an expanded Itinerary section highlighting the mission of FFI and especially our people-to-people focus of travel and hosting. We want to encourage new members to participate by giving them more clarity about what to expect on a Friendship Force Journey.

These itineraries are not meant to be exceedingly detailed or sightseeing-focused, but to indicate the time our ambassadors have with hosts, with the group in general, and possibly on their own. In order to overcome the misconception that we might be "just another travel club," we want to demonstrate how our hosts and ambassadors have ample time to share meals, make connections, and go off the beaten tourist path together. These itineraries will all have a caveat that they are subject to change, as flexibility is an important part of being a good FF ambassador. Overall, we strongly believe this will allow for more effective recruiting, clearer communication, and a continued focus on our mission throughout each Friendship Force Journey.
