Open World - Kosovo

In honor of the Kosovo delegation in May and the beautiful brides of June, we're highlighting a wedding tradition of a very traditional area of Kosovo.



THE DECORATED BRIDE

In Lubinje, a small, picturesque village of 3500 inhabitants, a few hours from Prishtina, the capital of Kosovo, members of the Trebesh community live in colorful houses. They also have a colorful custom – or rite – of beautifying brides on their wedding day.

As part of their rite every Lubinje bride must have their faces decorated meticulously and exquisitely, while their bodies are covered with five to six layers of traditional handmade costumes and accessories. Following the arduous decoration process, the bride is taken to her husband's house by horse. Her head

is covered with a veil to hide her face until she reaches her new home. Once there, the bride stands inside a room flanked by her husband's mother and sister, who attends to the new bride's every need. Meanwhile, the entire village visits to welcome the bride into the community."

The bride's costume, which gives her the appearance of a living doll, protects her from the evil eye, and discourages gossip and speculation.

FF REGIONAL CONFERENCE REFLECTIONS

Four Board members attended the FF Regional Conference in Covington, KY, on April 20-22. They made it a road trip - Janette House drove her new Chevy and Shelley Bain, Pat Headley, and Ginny Renda rode along. This was the first regional conference for Janette, Pat, and Ginny; their reflections are below.

Pat Headley --- While there was a great deal of emphasis by FFI to recruit younger members, there are still many opportunities for clubs to provide a variety of activities for the members we have now.

FFI described current clubs as being in one of four categories; Growing, Stagnant, Slowly Declining, and Crisis. All are based on membership numbers. It struck me that "Vibrant" might best describe our club, regardless of our membership count. Quality sometimes beats quantity.

Breakout sessions provided opportunities for clubs to share what is going well. I gained lots of ideas, such as small group dinners within our club with perhaps a mix of new members and established ones, provide day, overnight, or week-end trips, develop a mailing list for interested non-members, and creating innovative fundraising events. Other ideas included themed activities, and outdoor activities, such as hiking and biking, or adopt a school projects, and many others. Basically, we can do anything it takes to keep our club "vibrant."

Janette House --- I went to the Conference in Cincinnati with open expectations. I am aware that many of our members do everything that they can to make our Club a success. That same enthusiasm exists in every Club that attended the Conference.

The first session was "Embracing Change" – creating an environment open to change. Suggestions included - try new ways of doing things to get new results; think differently, plan differently, formulate plans differently, try new things, and be more open; make Club activities varied and exciting; consider varying the time and location; get members engaged and be welcoming to guests. These were all suggestions that might benefit every Club.

I also learned that for those travelers who purchase travel insurance, International has available a \$38.00 policy. Check the FFI website for what it covers. Important: always carry the insurance snapshot page with you when you travel.

There was so much information presented by speakers and workshop leaders, it was easy to come home enthused to keep our Club healthy and our members engaged.

Ginny Renda ---- The theme of the conference was Unlocking the Future of Friendship Force. The goal of the conference was to create a plan for change. To paraphrase a quote from the conference "It is not the strongest of the species that survives, nor the most intelligent, it is those receptive to change."

Some of the suggestions throughout the conference for energizing and growing Friendship Force Clubs included: more non-programmed time for journeys, more authentic cultural events, more people to people events, themed journeys, humanitarian activities, attending training sessions and conferences, learning best practices from other clubs, sharing newsletters, using networking to promote and fill journeys, hosting membership events, reaching out to non-members and other clubs and organizations, use free papers and magazines to promote club activities and new memberships, start global youth activities, adopt a school, have workshops to educate new ambassadors, include some non-members for journeys, allow incoming ambassadors to have wish days, and don't over plan.

As a fairly new member of Friendship Force, I found this conference full of knowledge, insight, and expertise. There were excellent ideas and suggestions of how to grow membership and energize our Friendship Force Club.

I ran across a poem that relates very well to the theme of this conference.

I had an idea just the other night; A fantastic idea it was too. Magnificent, wonderful, clear, and concise, Ingeniously, smart through and through. It was just unforgettable, wonderfully bright, Immortal and eternal too. And once I remember it, then I just might Be able to share it with you.

The point of this poem is that while many people have good ideas for solutions to problems, they sometimes fail to share those ideas or act upon them. Consequently, what might have been an ideal solution is lost. The message and content of conference can be summed up by saying sharing ideas with others will result in growth for all.

Shelley Bain --- The highlight for me was keynote speaker Bob Herring who wowed us all with his enthusiasm for encouraging Citizen Diplomacy, starting with kindergarten kids. We were ready to join his merry band before he finished his speech. Let's figure out how to bring his enthusiasm and knowledge to Des Moines.

I came home with a few new ideas, usually jotted down while listening to the presenters or the follow up questions, that I hope we can implement. All the participants received a CD of the presentations to share with other members.

We learned a little about the next FFI Conference in July 2019 in Boulder, Colorado. It will be a new kind of international conference, on a college campus, and in our own back yard. Mark your calendar now.
