About Fort Des Moines Park

This 135-acre county park rests on a portion of the former Calvary post established on Army Post Road in 1903. The park features a rare stand of aspen trees, a native tree arboretum, outdoor classroom, 3-season shelter, and a 13-acre pond surrounded by a trail. You can fish, picnic, hike, or play on modern playground facilities. A volleyball court, horseshoe pits, and picnic shelters are a few other park amenities.

Formerly U.S. Government property, this parkland served as the first Officers' Training Camp for black cadets and the U.S. Women's Auxiliary Army Corps during World War II. Fort Des Moines Park officially became Polk County Conservation property in 1972.

Journeys

Journey Update

All journeys for 2020 were cancelled or postponed due to pandemic. For FFGDM, outbound journeys cancelled or postponed were a domestic journey to Knoxville TN and Big Canoe GA, a domestic journey to Dayton and an international journey to Brazil. An inbound international journey from Ottawa was postponed. Regarding the Knoxville/Big Canoe journey, ambassadors had been selected and most planning completed; thanks to Shelley Bain for all her hard work putting that together. *... continued*

Current plans are:

- 2021:
 - September: Inbound from Dayton
 - October: Outbound to Big Canoe
- 2022: Pending matching from FFI
 - April: Outbound to Knoxville
 - May: Inbound from Big Canoe
 - August: Inbound from Ottawa
 - September: Outbound to Dayton

FFI has begun the 2022 matching process. We have submitted our club's availability for hosting. The Board determined we can host 1 domestic and 1 international journey. We have requested Big Canoe for the domestic and Ottawa for the international. Requests for outbound journeys will be made soon.

We are exploring the possibility of creating a virtual journey video about Des Moines that would be available to FFI members worldwide. FFI promotes the virtual journeys via the Journey Catalog email you should all received. An upcoming example is "Faces and Places: Sibiu, Romania" on Tuesday, November 10, at 1:00 pm CT, hosted by Camelia Grigore of FF Sibiu. Iowans Can Sign Up in Des Moines for Global Entry

Des Moines Register 10/1/2020

Despite having no direct flight connections for international travelers, the Des Moines airport is now an official enrollment center for Global Entry, a U.S. Customs and Border Protection program that allows expedited clearance for pre-approved travelers upon re-entry to the United States.

Travelers <u>can sign up</u> for interviews with the federal agency at the Des Moines International Airport as part of the approval process, which also requires a background check. With Global Entry, travelers can more easily and quickly re-enter the United States after international travel by using self-serve kiosks at select airports. The kiosks scan a traveler's passport or permanent resident card and fingerprints and allow completion of a customs declaration. Travelers with Global Entry do not have to wait in typically long lines at customs, though they may be subject to additional screening.

Des Moines does not have a kiosk because it does not serve as an international hub. But Iowans will still benefit from having a convenient option to sign up for the \$100 service locally instead of having to do it elsewhere, said Kayla Kovarna, communications manager for the airport. Each approved Global Entry application lasts for five years.

"As an enrollment center, lowans will be able to interview locally — rather than out of state — to obtain Global Entry for when they travel internationally," she said. "Domestic travelers will also benefit when flying because Global Entry gives participants (Transportation Security Administration) PreCheck clearance to breeze through TSA security checkpoints." With PreCheck, travelers can go through expedited security screening without having to remove shoes, laptops, liquids, belts, or jackets. Des Moines' airport provides this service.
