President's Message

Hello Friendship Force Members and Friends,

In the forward of the book The Other Side of the Mountain, by Charlene Terrell, Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter talk about being asked by Rev. Wayne Smith to establish The Friendship Force. The Carters readily agreed. What resulted is the "people to people diplomacy" we now know as a worldwide organization, made up of, as the Carters say, ordinary men and women reaching out to other ordinary men and women all over the world. I'm sharing this history with you because the author, Charlene Terrell, was a member of the Big Canoe, Georgia Friendship Force Club; the club we will host May 3-8, 2022.

By all accounts, Wayne Smith was a dreamer. He was also ebullient, energetic, enthusiastic, and downright unrelenting in making his dream of worldwide friendship become a reality. He first presented the idea to Jimmy Carter in July of 1976 while the presidential campaign was still in full swing. He was so convincing, that after the election, President Carter brought the idea to a Governor's Convention. From there, our own Robert D. Ray, took the idea seriously, and with his wife Billie Ray, made things happen. Des Moines was the first club in 1977 to conduct a journey with Ireland (formerly called exchanges) shortly after Atlanta exchanged with England. Georgia and lowa set examples for the rest of the world.

These exchanges were important for obvious reasons, and succeeded because President Carter pledged his personal support, but no government involvement whatsoever. "We'll give you no money – and no orders," he said. And that was good enough for Wayne Smith, who worked tirelessly while also maintaining his duties as a minister, eventually becoming a full-time ambassador for Friendship Force International, officially chartered on March 17, 1977. By 1985 there were clubs all over the world, eventually reaching 15,000 pre-Covid.

Merely a month after that charter, FFI had developed an official purpose, too long to reprint here, but basically promoting world peace through home stays. It was made clear that these exchanges were NOT tourist trips or shopping excursions, but personal diplomacy exchanges, designed to help people all over the world make friends with each other. People would discover that they were "more alike than different," said Smith. They were to eat at each other's tables, visit each other's milieu, and go home feeling refreshingly good about having made new friends.

Georgia and Iowa have a long-shared history in that they were pioneers in a new concept called The Friendship Force. Please welcome our Georgia ambassadors, whether you are hosting, day hosting, or attending any of the other wonderfully planned activities for this journey.

Join Us in Dayton! September 7 – 14, 2022

Journey leaders Cathy Jensen and Lenne Orona are looking for 14 Friendship Force of Greater Des Moines members to join them for a 7-night visit to Ohio's "Surprising Place" --- Dayton. The city of 138,000 is diverse in its culture, business and history. While Dayton is proud of its aviation heritage, Wright Patterson Air Force Base and US Air Force Museum, it also appeals to those interested in art, archaeology, science, horticulture, and the outdoors. Westcott, designed by Frank Lloyd Wright, is the only prairie style house in Ohio, Woodland Cemetery and Arboretum is one of the oldest garden cemeteries in the US, and the Packard Museum will thrill automobile enthusiasts. The Dayton International Peace Museum is the dedicated to conflict resolution, equity, social justice, tolerance, and protecting our natural world. Young's Jersey Dairy promises homemade ice cream, and the Dayton Art Institute ranks in the top 3% of all art museums in North America. Most of these sites are scheduled for our packed visit. We will also join them for their annual picnic.

For those who want to start the journey early or continue travel afterward, Dayton is 50 miles from Cincinnati, 135 miles from Lexington KY, 75 miles from Columbus, and 255 miles from Pittsburgh. From Des Moines to Dayton is 589 miles.

The journey cost is estimated to be \$435 which includes all fees and program costs. 4/21 - DOWNTOWN KNOXVILLE

We met at a church to begin a tour of downtown led by HC Mike. He told the story of the Tennessee theater. We saw the Bijou theater and then walked to the Old Courthouse, which is still used. There we saw the monument to John Sevier, first governor of Tennessee, and his two wives. We heard their very interesting stories. He had 10 children with his first wife, who he married when he was 17 and she was 15. After she died, he married his second wife, who he had saved from an Indian raid and had 8 more children. A bonus was that another visitor to the monuments was a descendant who happened to visit at the same time.

We went to WDVX radio 89.9 at the visitor center to attend the Blue Plate Special show at noon. The show is on Tuesday-Saturday and features local and traveling musicians. The station is a public community listener-supported station focused on roots music, and the show is free. – Mike

We also toured Market Square where we saw the monuments to women's suffrage and Senator John Burn and his mother. Burn cast the deciding vote to give women

suffrage after an appeal from his mother Febe to "do the right thing". Good for Knoxville that they honor such important people in the fight for women's rights.

The small group dinner that night was a delight of mixed messages. We were warmly greeted by our hosts, Janis and Bruce Robinson who served sangria and champagne, prepared a delicious and healthy low-carb dinner and THEN offered dessert - fruit cobbler, flourless chocolate torte, chocolate mousse, and whipping cream. It is the only national park that doesn't charge an admittance fee.

We went on to Gatlinburg and visited some art and craft galleries. Last stop Friday afternoon was Santa's Claus-et in Gatlinburg. It was a very cute Christmas store with many rooms of decorations. Ginny bought 2 Christmas ornaments. I bought some learning activities for the boys. She wanted you to know that she hasn't bought one clothing item.
