#### President's Message

Dear Members,

Except for getting food poisoning and contacting COVD, it's been a very good year. I was fortunate to go on two amazing journeys to Knoxville, Tennessee and Dayton, Ohio, and I was able to attend most Friendship Force events which were educational as well as enjoyable.

There are several things I would like to share with you in this last 2022 President's Message.

*First*, we told you last year that we would need to raise dues in 2023. The good news is, we will not be raising dues in 2023 because Friendship Force International has recently decided not to raise the dues we send to them for each member. Your 2023 dues will remain at \$35 per member.

**Second**, it is important that each member register on the new FFI website at My Friendship Force sign in. If you have trouble doing this or if you do not have a computer, you may call Barbara Bailey at 1-952-200-7202 or Pat Headley at 1-641-226-2146 and one of them will help you.

**Third**, there is a new 2022 Ambassador Application and Agreement Form. This form can be found on the FFI website at Ambassador Application and Agreement. You will no longer be able to use the old form.

**Fourth**, FFI is requiring that each ambassador who plans to go on a domestic or international journey must have adequate travel and medical insurance to cover medical care and emergencies. An ambassador must sign a waiver if choosing not to carry travel and/or medical insurance; see your journey coordinator for details.

You can secure travel insurance through FFI, insurance companies like Nationwide or Allianz, or through your credit card if included. It is important that you read the entire policy to determine if the policy will truly fit your needs and cover emergencies.

**Fifth**, this is not new but worth repeating - if an ambassador cancels more than 60 days before departure, the FFI Fee and host club Program Fee will be refunded. There is no refund of any fees if an ambassador cancels less than 60 days before the start of the journey. Therefore, it is important to carry travel insurance.

**Sixth**, Pat Headley's time as co-president will expire December 31. Fortunately, she will remain on the board for another year, and so we will continue to have her guidance, influence, and involvement in the operation of our club. This is a great comfort to me and will benefit our club. Thank you, Pat, for your 6 years of leadership in Friendship Force of Greater Des Moines.

As always, I hope that you will reach out to me if you have questions, concerns, or suggestions.

In closing, I hope that you will take the time to enjoy your family and friends during this holiday season; and I hope that your holidays will be filled with smiles, peace, and happiness.




## A Journey to Dayton by Lenne Orona, Ambassador Co-coordinator

The Journey started with the Welcome Party. Bobi McDermott, Dayton Host Coordinator, reviewed the week's itinerary. In addition, the members recommended that we try their city's favorites while there: Bill's Donuts, Marion's Pizza and Killer Brownies from the famous Dorothy Lane Market, which many of us did.



We visited Dayton Aviation Heritage National Historic Park & Interpretive Center, Wright Memorial, Huffman Prairie Flying Field, where the Wright Bros flew their experimental airplanes, and the National Museum of the US Air Force near the Wright Paterson Air Force Base. At the Air Force base, one set of the Dooms Day planes could be viewed ready and waiting 24 hours a day for a call. President Biden was visiting while we were there and we could see Air Force One in the distance. The Air Force Museum is the oldest and largest







Dayton's club member Joe Scullion was our docent for the Dayton's Art Institute visit. Joe provided us with ways to look at art a little differently than we might be used to. He used one painting titled "The Flea Hunt" to illustrate how light enhances a story. On our visit to the International Peace Museum,

Bill Meeks of Dayton's club told us how the Dayton Peace Accord came to be signed there in 1995 that ended the Bosnia war. . We toured Historic Woodland Cemetery where significant gravestones were the Wright Brothers, Erma Bombeck, James Ritty, who developed the cash register and later

sold the patent to James Paterson, who founded the National Cash Register Company. (NCR). Of interest in the cemetery were well placed benches with bowler hats attached to them to represent Dayton's fondness of Wilber and Orville Wright.

Dayton is a city of inventors. In the 1900's it became the invention capital of the USA. Throughout the city there are models of inventions to honor these important people. Charles Kettering invented the self-starter engine replacing the crank! Frei created the ice cube tray. James Ritty the Cash Register and of course the Wright Brothers. As



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Kettering said, invention is creativity, curiosity, and perseverance. Can you believe that the man who designed airplanes did not believe in refrigeration and kept his ice in the wall on the outside of his home so no one would track dirt in, Wilber who suffered from sciatic pain most of his life remodeled a chair into a recliner with arm rests that held metal swings for his books, a back that was permanently reclined for his position and attached an ottoman to act as a foot rest.

Dubbed the "Poet Laureate of the Negro race" by Booker T Washington. Paul Laurence Dunbar (1872-1906) is best known for his lively dialect

poems. Dunbar also wrote fine poems in standard English that captured many

elements of the black experience in America. His home was one of the stops on our tour. He became the first African American to support himself financially through his writing. His three-story home was on our tour. Mr. Dunbar and the Wright brothers were good friends with him officiating at his sister's wedding

One of our quieter mornings was spent on a walking tour of Deeds Park near the river walk. There we shared in celebrating Dayton's Friendship Force Club's contribution to this revitalized area. In 2003 a permanent Peace Pole



Monument was installed by the club with paver

stones surrounding it with the names of the various inbound journeys they had hosted. This park provides quiet spots to "just look" with art works celebrating its former citizens.

Our last day in Dayton found us leaving for the town of Springfield to tour the Westcott House. Who knew that Frank Lloyd Wright designed and built a house in nearby Springfield, Ohio. The house was built between 1904 and 1908 and is described "as one of the top twenty Frank Lloyd Wright houses in the world.

After a nice lunch we toured the Heritage Center of Clark County. The center extends an entire city block, houses

an extraordinary museum that recounts the history of America's Heartland. In 1806 Thomas Jefferson authorized National Road: the first federally funded interstate highway. Priceless mementos have been assembled to open an exciting window on seven generations of history.



Our final event was an all-club picnic. Approximately 60 members attended and everyone enjoyed themselves reliving what we had done the last 7 days. Joe Scullion made Origami dragons for everyone attending. Unfortunately, by the next evening many attending, 6 out of 8 Des Moines attending, become ill with salmonella. It

was later determined it was the catered chicken. However, that did not change our feeling of being totally at home with our Friendship Force partners in Dayton.



#### **Club Activities**

#### Jester Park Nature Center

On a September 20, a recording breaking hot day, fourteen members of our club met at the Jester Park Nature Center northwest of the metro. Once in our air-conditioned classroom with lunches at hand, naturalist Heidi Anderson enlightened us about the history of Jester Park, which opened in 1958, and the Nature Center, which opened in 2018, all under the auspices of Polk County Conservation. PCC manages 16,000 acres of parks, wetlands, trails, prairies, and woodlands in Polk County.

Heidi informed us about the multitude of programs that PCC has available for the young and old and the events which help support the programming. One event drawing large crowds is Glow Wild in September that features a towering bonfire, live music, crafts, activities for all ages, and plenty of S'mores and other eats!

The Nature Center itself has interactive activities and is surrounded by many acres of restored prairies as well as streams and ponds. Outdoor exploration opportunities abound here in summer and winter as gear such as kayaks



and cross-country skis are available for rent. There is also an archery center. Polk County Conservation's goal is to encourage everyone to get out and enjoy the great outdoors and the Nature Center is a great place to start.

# Friendship Force Walkers




### ... are Pat Westphal and Carol Grimm?
