### Where in the World...

### ... is Darlene Blake Beers? In Australia!



This was my first international journey with the Friendship Force. I am very well-traveled and I expected this to be just another trip to a country I had not been. I had no idea that this journey would be a life-changing event. I travelled with FF Knoxville - we had 4 from Knoxville, 2 from Georgia, and 1 each from Canada, Texas, North Carolina, Alabama, and lowa.



The first three days we spent in Sydney getting to know each other and acclimated to the time change of 15 hours ahead of lowa time. We went on ferry rides, toured the historical sights, visited museums, saw the Sydney Opera House, ate in lovely restaurants, went to beaches, and walked and walked and walked until we could walk no more.

We started our group adventure with FF Gold Coast (525 miles north of Sydney) and the host club went out of their way to make us feel welcome, ensure our comfort, and fulfill our every need and expectation. I had the good fortune to stay with a most charming lady, who became a close friend.

We watched surfers on one of the best surfing beaches in Australia, Surfers Paradise. Afterward we had dinner at a local restaurant where you could watch the fishermen bringing in their catch of the day. We fed pelicans after we fed ourselves with a traditional fish and chips lunch. We soared to the top of the 322.5-meter high Q1 Tower that was the world's tallest residential building from 2005-2011 where we had lunch with a panoramic view. We toured the Volunteer Marine Rescue facility and cruised on their rescue boats the length of the harbor.

At the Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary I had my first encounter with kangaroos, Tasmanian devils, koalas and deadly reptiles. We visited Burleigh Heads, toured the

Aboriginal Center, and saw Tamorin Mountain. We had dinners at the home of several club members that cemented our friendships. We said goodbye knowing some of us will meet again.

Our next adventure started with a train ride to the North Moreton Bay Region, north of Brisbane. The area has beautiful beaches, scenic mountains, lakes, rainforest walks, boutique wineries, kangaroos on the doorstep, and the warmest people. Upon our arrival we were welcomed at lunch with most FF North Moreton members in attendance and met my host, another charming lady I now call my friend.



The next day we had morning tea at Friendship Grove in Caboolture, looked out at the Glasshouse Mountains Lookout, had a picnic lunch at Mary Cairncross Scenic Reserve, visited a quaint village – Montville, and had dinner in Toorbul on Pumicestone Passage opposite Bribie Island where kangaroos bounce along. We toured South Bank, the premier lifestyle and cultural destination on Brisbane River, with lush parklands, world-class eateries, stunning river views, museums that were constructed on the site of 1988 Brisbane's World Expo.



We toured City Hall that has a fabulous gallery of local artists, cruised the river on a catamaran, and walked and walked and walked.

After our day in the big city, we were whisked away to Maryvale, a small village where the Club President lives on a cattle farm where we were treated to traditional country hospitality and hosted overnight by Maryvale locals. On way back we visited Queen Mary Falls and town of Killarney.

We spent a day at Steve Irwin's Australia Zoo, whose television program I have enjoyed for years. This is where I made a new friend who was surprisingly heavy.

The Melbourne Cup Day Farewell Party and Dinner was the highlight of our trip. This race is much like our Kentucky Derby with all the fanfare. We all dressed in our best with exotic hats and had the opportunity to be jockeys in the race. I am not a fast runner so I didn't win, but I did make the trophy presentation to one of the winners.



All too soon our journey was over. Traveling is one of the best ways to promote global understanding across the barriers that separate people. The Friendship Force is a force to be reckoned with.
